JobTrain enters new era

Menlo Park job-training center has helped thousands land jobs

Bells ringing in the workplace: Fire alarm? Stock exchange closing? If you're at JobTrain, that sound means someone got a job, and everyone spills into the hallways to celebrate.

There's been a lot of bell-ringing since JobTrain opened in 1965. The nonprofit focuses on providing free or low-cost services to underserved populations, such as veterans, the homeless, the long-term unemployed, parolees, people recovering from addictions, the underemployed, and at-risk youth.

In 2012 alone, 8,645 people came to the nonprofit for help with job training, developing life skills, getting their GED and other challenges. Of those, 77

percent found work, according to the organization's most recent annual report. That was a banner year as JobTrain saw a record number of clients.

The nonprofit racked up success after success with Sharon Williams as executive director until she decided to retire after 34 years in the top spot. Now another director is at the helm, and the Almanac caught up with Nora Sobolov on Sept. 4, about 12 hours into her new job.

The shelves of her new office were still empty, as she hadn't had much time to unpack.

Ms. Sobolov comes with a background in finance

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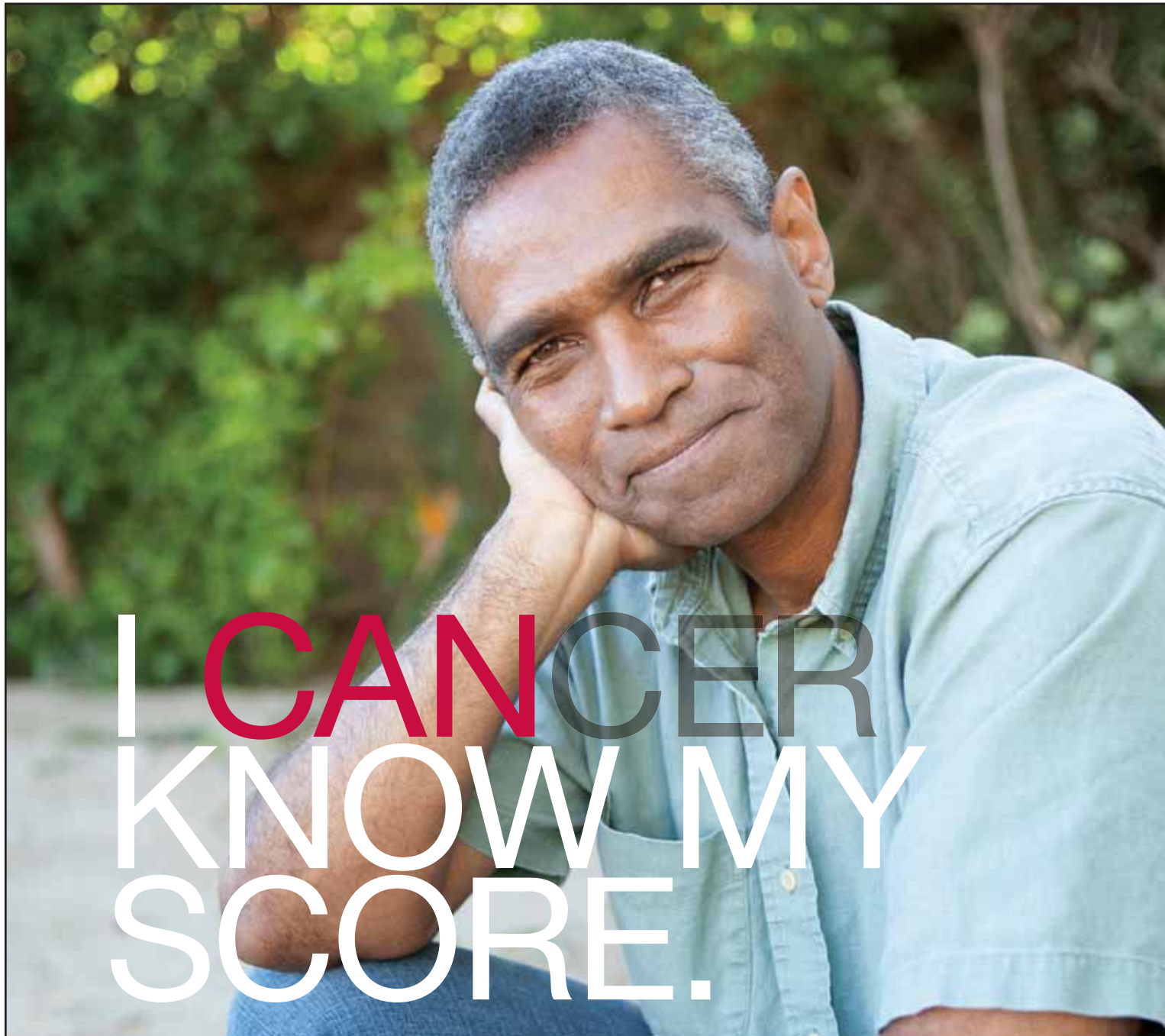

and a long history of nonprofit management. She co-founded the Community Forward Fund, a loan and financial coaching service for nonprofits in Canada; Housing Help, a one-stop service for the homeless; the Canadian Lung Association; and the Canadian Cooperative Association, an umbrella group for credit unions and cooperative businesses.

Her very first job, she said, involved working with kids whose parents were involved with gangs in Ontario, Canada. "I lived in the community, so I'd seen the effects of violence," she said. "The real difference were the

community mentors, who stayed long after the program ended. Just by being there and being present, it made a big difference."

At Housing Help, she used to close the office for half a day to make time to talk to senior government officials and other social-service providers, creating a network that considered the whole person and community-wide initiatives rather than isolated problems — an approach that JobTrain shares.

A common thread through all of her jobs has been the drive to help people get and keep jobs that pay a livable wage. JobTrain aims for \$15 to \$16 an

hour, Ms. Sobolov said, which is "not at the high end, but achievable."

Community collaboration is both something she hopes to expand and a quality that drew her to JobTrain. Fifty people showed up at a "welcome lunch," she told the Almanac, including many community members who wanted to meet the person stepping into the shoes of Ms. Williams, who helped make JobTrain a beloved asset.

"They feel really, really attached to this place," Ms. Sobolov said. "There's a great team atmosphere. Everyone helps each other." One sign of that attachment lies in the not-uncommon sight of a former client now returned to JobTrain to work on the staff.

Ms. Sobolov expects to spend her first year learning how JobTrain works, getting to know an organization and the community's needs first before trying to tweak it. One wants to know what the key ingredients are in the "secret sauce," she said, before deciding what's next.

The economy offers hints at what may be on JobTrain's horizon. As electric cars gain popularity, and manufacturing starts to rebound in the United States, the doors may be opening for manufacturing and auto-

motive training as a viable career path, she suggested. With employers like Facebook and Google hiring JobTrain's graduates, she'd like to create more employment opportunities with local businesses. And then there's the ongoing challenge that all nonprofits face of finding revenue sources that don't rely on any one program.

The array of training programs include culinary arts, digital arts, construction, solar power, computer technician, and medical office assistant.

One-stop shop

A key ingredient in the "secret sauce" is the number of services JobTrain offers at its 1200 O'Brien Drive location. In addition to job training, clients can get help with tax preparation, applying for benefits, immigration issues, and mental health counseling. The site also provides child care.

Director of program operations Alonzo Emery, after 15 years at JobTrain, may be another crucial ingredient. Enthusiasm spills through his voice as he describes the array of training programs — culinary arts (there's a professional kitchen on site), digital arts, construction, solar power, computer technician, telecommunications technician, medical office assistant, office assistant, health care worker.

"Even during the tough (economic) times, we were still successful," Mr.

Emery said.

He showed the Almanac a class of about 15 students learning the finer points of the pulmonary system. Even at 2:40 p.m. on a warm late summer afternoon, everyone looked wide awake.

Companies that have hired JobTrain graduates have praised their work ethic, Mr. Emery commented, and often return

to hire more, sometimes taking groups at a time.

Everyone learns basic computer skills, to be able to create and email resumes. Clients can earn a GED through JobTrain; 218 students took exam preparation classes during the 2011-12 fiscal year, according to the nonprofit's most recent annual report.

JobTrain provides placement

services, work outfits through its "Clothes Encounter" program — alterations are free as needed — and coaching. The majority of the organization's clients find work, but it's not unusual to see familiar faces return to JobTrain — as staff members.

Natalie Tercero said she used to drive by the nonprofit before finally deciding to walk through the door as a client. Now she works at JobTrain as the coordinator for Single Stop, a national organization dedicated to connecting low-

income clients with government services.

Other clients have gone on to work for Kaiser Permanente, the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission and in the kitchen of popular local restaurant "The Refuge."

Mr. Emery smiled as he walked through the halls. He explained that he understands the challenges facing his clients. As a high school student, "college prep was a foreign language" until someone took an interest in his future, he said. He went on to Arizona State

University, then to professional football before finding a new career as a counselor.

"I'm a product of this type of program," he said. "If students want a chance to move forward, JobTrain can give them that chance." ■

A celebration of the life of John Chaput, who died Aug. 31 at his childhood home in Menlo Park, will be held at 11 a.m. Friday, Sept. 13, at St. Raymond's Church, 1100 Santa Cruz Ave. in Menlo Park. He was 66.

He grew up in Menlo Park, attended St. Raymond School, was the leader on his Seybold Realty Little League team as a rare left-handed catcher, and attended Serra High School, where he excelled in swimming and later, in water polo at the College of San Mateo.

His command of the guitar and his talent for painting and drawing shone during these years, the family says.

He attended San Jose State,

taking time out to spend nearly a year as an Amigos Anonymous volunteer in Mexico. That volunteer service was to follow him as he gave time to organizations such as Rosener House, the Italian Catholic Federation, Serra Club/St. Patrick's Seminary and most recently, St. Raymond Church.

"All who came in contact with him will remember him as a kind soul whose selflessness and sense of humor provided a special moment during the course of their day," the family says.

He is survived by his mother, Rita Chaput; sisters Renee Zotter and Michele Korn; brothers Steve and Nick; and several nephews and nieces.

Court date in assault, burglary case

A 21-year-old Palo Alto man arrested in the Westridge neighborhood of Portola Valley on April 21 on charges of assault, vandalism, auto burglary and reckless driving is set to be arraigned at 8:45 a.m. Sept. 12.

Alexander Stefan Dombovic is out of custody on \$50,000 bail.

The assault occurred when a 13-year-old Portola Valley boy heard a car in the driveway of his home, and saw a man rummaging through his father's vehicle. The boy asked the man what he was doing, and the man allegedly struck the boy on the

shoulder with a bat.

The man fled in an SUV, and deputies, in the area on another matter, saw the SUV with lights off heading directly at them on the wrong side of the road. They swerved to avoid a collision and began a car chase. In the 900 block of Westridge Drive, the SUV plunged down an embankment. Deputies said they found about 129 pieces of mail from 18 local addresses in the car.

Fire extinguished near Webb Ranch

Firefighters from San Mateo County and the Menlo Park Fire Protection District fought and quickly extinguished a grass fire on Friday, Sept. 6, at 2720 Alpine Road, near the Webb Ranch fruit and vegetable stand near Interstate 280.

The fire had been reported at 11:16 a.m. and by 11:42, it had been knocked down and then mopped up, firefighters said. The fire involved between one and two acres of light grass, a "flashy fuel," they said. The fire never threatened any structures, they said.

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CDC reports Lyme disease bigger risk than thought

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recently reported that Lyme disease is a much more significant health risk than previously thought, with as many as 300,000 new cases each year.

Lyme is a miserable disease that if left untreated or misdiagnosed, can lead to a lifetime of suffering.

The CDC's report confirms what many have suspected for a long time — that Lyme disease is a significant public health concern. While the reports indicate that the bulk of cases are in the Northeast, we Californians should pause before we take that sigh of relief.

The fact is, Lyme disease has been reported in California and 48 other states. The California Department of Health reports that the Western black legged tick, which transmits Lyme disease in California, has been found in 56 counties, and ticks

testing positive for the bacteria have been found in over 40 counties.

At Bay Area Lyme Foundation, through a grant to Stanford's Woods Institute, we have been documenting Bay Area tick infection rates. There is no question that Lyme is here, along with several other nasty co-infections.

Luckily, the overall tick infection rate has not reached East Coast levels and the number of human cases is low — for now. Let's keep it that way by understanding: (1) the environments ticks prefer (wooded, more humid); (2) that in California tick season is year-round; and (3) that there are steps you can take (dressing properly, tick checks, and more) to lessen exposure.

You should know the symptoms and the absolute importance of early treatment.

Californians can take the lead in solving this Lyme crisis by finding reliable diagnostic tests that will ensure early treatment and a cure for those still suffering. Right now, diagnostic tests

are woefully inadequate, meaning you could wait many weeks until you know or worse, be misdiagnosed and not treated.

For too long, research for Lyme disease has been neglected, receiving \$1 in per patient funding compared to \$910 for West Nile disease, for example. Lyme research has not benefited from the world class research

institutions in our state or the technology and talent of Silicon Valley.

We Californians can change that and there is reason for hope. Since Bay Area Lyme Foundation started a little over a year ago, we have been impressed by the pockets of innovation we have found in our own backyard and worked hard to apply those

to Lyme disease.

Nathaniel Healy takes over as Menlo head of school

Nathaniel (Than) Healy has taken over as head of school at Menlo School, replacing longtime head Norman Colb, who left Menlo at the end of the 2012-2013 school year, after 20 years at Menlo.

Mr. Healy's arrival is the most notable change on campus for the new school year, but accompanies the expansion of a number of school programs.

Go Menlo, a sustainability campaign focused on reducing vehicle traffic to and from Menlo, has added a new bus route, serving students in the Los Altos and Cupertino areas.

The school has also continued to develop its pioneering Global Programs & Studies trips and exchanges that allow students a learning experience in different cultures and countries.

A number of new teachers have also joined Menlo's nearly 100 faculty members.

"The school has been focusing

on the transition from a long-time, very successful head of school to a new head of school and that's where most of the school's energy is," Mr. Healy said.

His transition has been near-seamless, he said. After making the move from Seattle, he said that he and his family are enjoying the weather and are settling into the community. "Every move has its challenges ... but California's familiar to me ... and this is a little bit of coming home for me," he said.

Mr. Healy began his career as a history and psychology teacher, as well as basketball and water polo coach, at Stevenson School in Pebble Beach, California.

Most recently, he was assis-

tant head and upper school director of Lakeside School in Seattle.

Over the summer, he said, he met with nearly every member of the Menlo faculty, staff, and board of trustees.

"Menlo School is a super high functioning, high performing school," he said, adding that any "urge to come in and change a whole bunch of stuff" would be misplaced.

His plan, he said, is to "continue the trajectory" that the school is already on. "Great schools are constantly in a state of becoming and when you stop evolving, you start sliding backwards," he said.

"To serve the students well in the fast-paced world they are going to be graduating into, we have to have constant conversations about how to remain relevant and provide the education that they are going to need."

Menlo School, established in 1915, is an independent day school serving 795 students in grades 6-12. ■

Removed barrier frees steelhead to migrate

Representatives of federal, state and local agencies on Sept. 5 announced the elimination of a 105-year-old barrier in a creek between Palo Alto and Menlo Park to allow endangered steelhead trout to migrate upstream from San Francisco Bay.

The project by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the National Marine Fisheries Service, California State Coastal Conservancy and San Mateo County removed the concrete wall from San Francisquito Creek that was blocking most of the migrating native trout, EPA spokesman David Yogi said.

The barrier was placed in the creek in 1908 to protect the nearby historic El Palo redwood tree from flooding but prevented many juvenile steelhead from swimming upstream to spawn, said Brian Wardman, an engineer from West Sacramento-based Northwest Hydraulic Consultants who worked on the project.

The fish make the upstream swim from the bay each November, when water levels in the free-flowing creek are high due to seasonal rainfall, Mr. Ward-

man said.

The project removed the last obstacle for migrating steelhead in the San Francisquito, identified as a critical habitat for the fish. The creek serves as the boundary between the cities of Palo Alto and Menlo Park and the counties of Santa Clara and San Mateo.

Jared Blumenfeld, the EPA's Pacific Southwest regional administrator, said with the barrier gone, the steelhead, already a federally threatened species, will be free to move 40 miles upstream from the bay to spawning and rearing grounds.

The unimpeded access to the creek, flowing east toward the bay from Searsville Dam in Portola Valley near Woodside, will improve prospects for the fish species, which have not been doing particularly well in the bay, Mr. Blumenfeld said.

The project to extract the wall, called a "Bonde Weir," from the creek came about after the partnering government agencies together obtained \$309,000, including a \$75,000 grant from the EPA.

Visitors will be able to taste rare pears, apples and grapes from Filoli's Gentlemen's Orchard containing more than 650 varieties of heirloom fruit. Children can visit the pumpkin patch, choose and decorate a pumpkin to take home, or help Filoli volunteers operate the apple cider press.

A catered barbecue or vegetarian lunch is available by advance purchase only: \$20 for adults and \$11 for children.

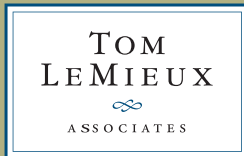

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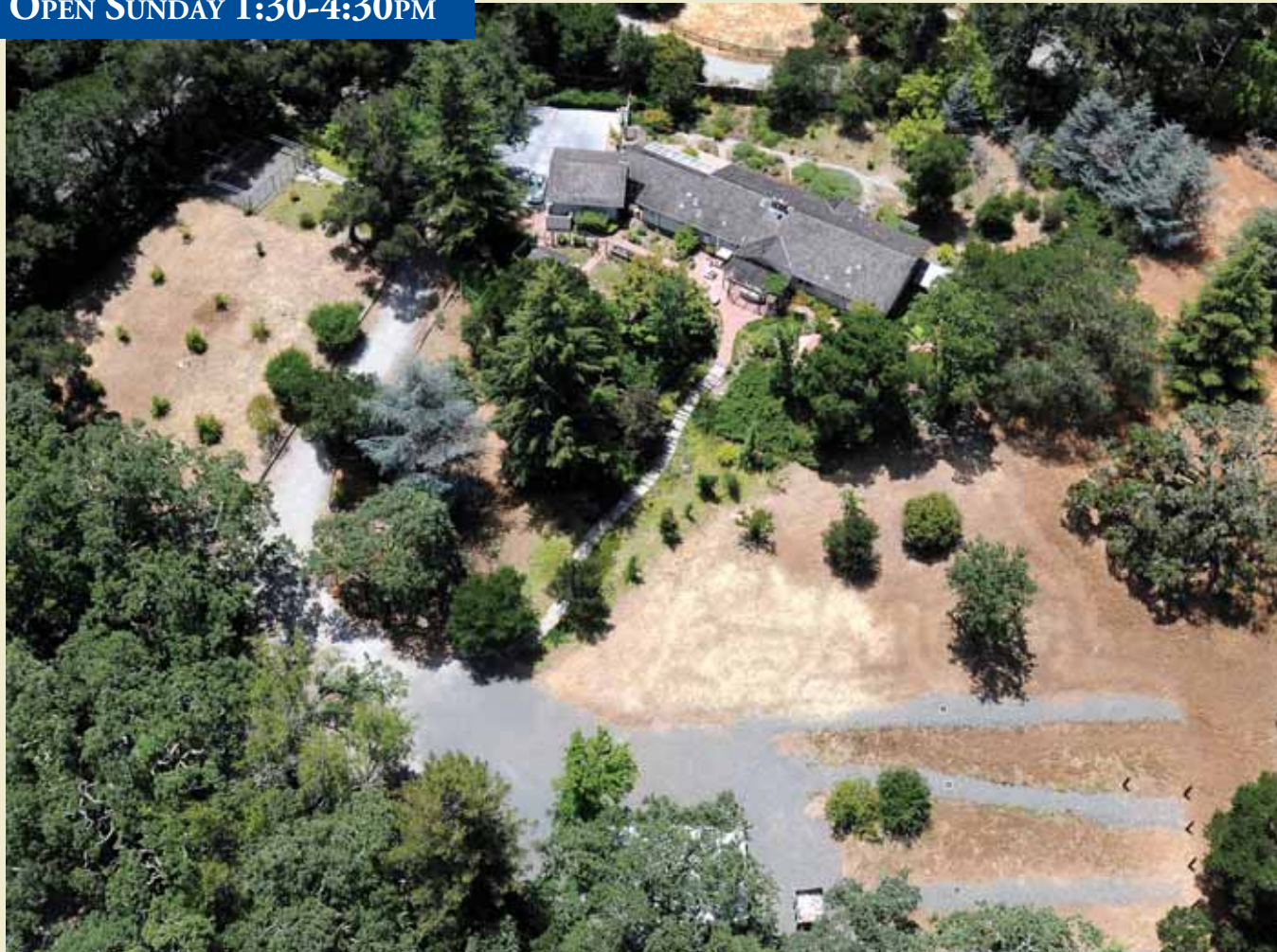

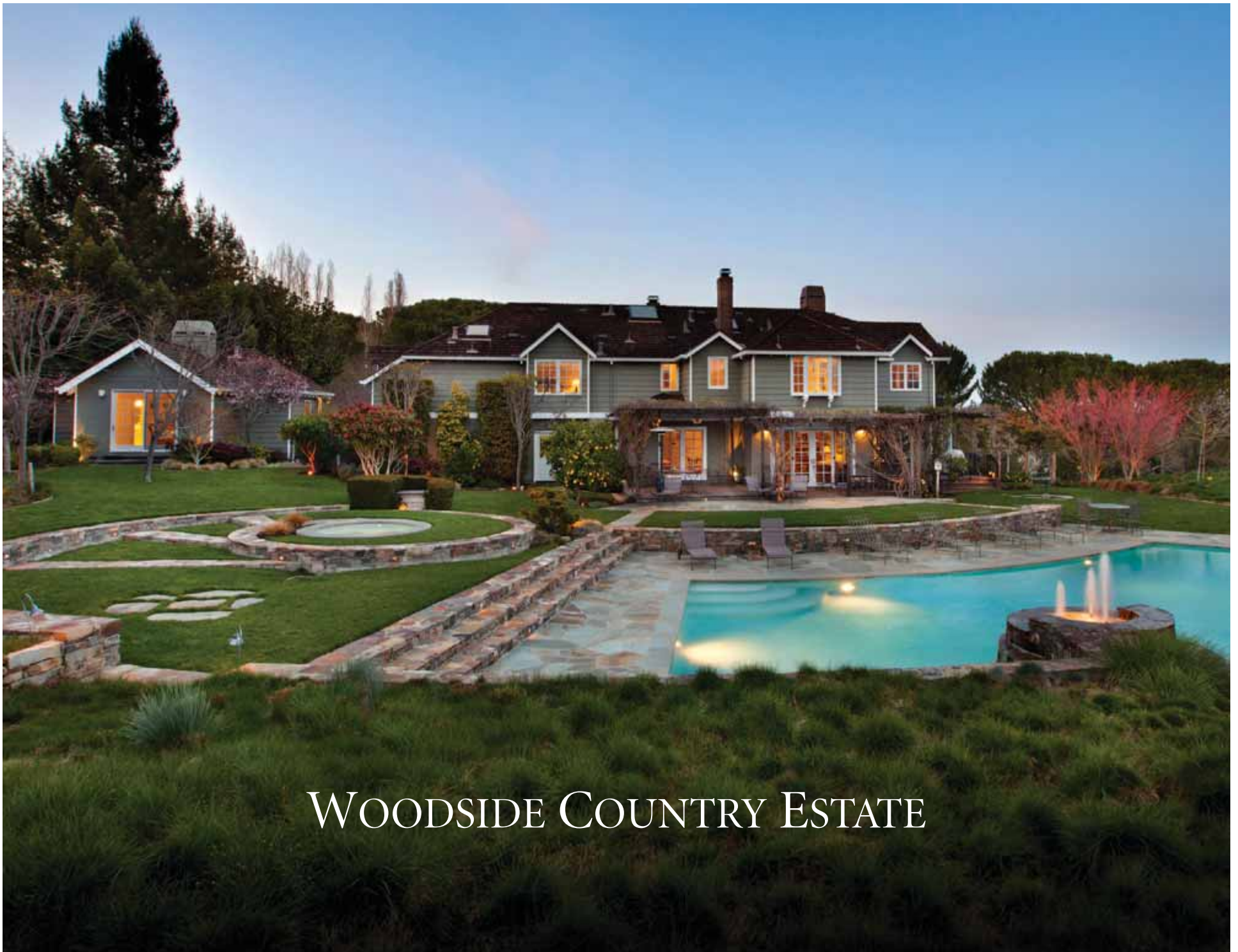
