Empowering girls

In its 50th year, local Junior League reboots to focus on helping girls become leaders in science, technology, engineering and math

With more than 50 years of community activism under its belt, including nearly 100 community projects, the Junior League of Palo Alto-Mid Peninsula has hit on a new strategy to fulfill its mission to “promote voluntarism, develop the potential of women, and improve communities through the effective action and leadership of trained volunteers.”

This is the San Francisco Bay Area, after all, and we’ve decided to take a page from the startup playbook and “disrupt” our traditional approach to community service.

Last year, our members voted overwhelmingly in favor of adopting a new, targeted focus: empowering girls to be leaders in the areas of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (known as STEM).

Over the course of the 2015-2016 League year, we’ll launch two new community projects in keeping with this

theme, while our Project Development Committee explores additional partnership and grant-making opportunities.

“The changes we are making this year, and in the years to follow, aren’t random,” says current League President Jan Hickman. “They will allow us to make a more focused and relevant impact on our community, to recharge our members, and to recruit dynamic new women to the JLPA-MP.”

So, why promote girls in STEM? The numbers offer a compelling case. Women in the United States earn 57 percent of bachelor’s degrees in all fields. Yet, just 18 percent of computer science degrees and 19 percent of engineering degrees go to women, the National Science Foundation reports.

Those disparities continue out in the workforce, where, according to a 2010 study by the Kauffman Foundation, just

Why is it called *Junior League?*

Local Junior League member and Menlo Park resident Robin Hindery Enan provides this history:

Founded in 1901 by 19-year-old New York social activist Mary Harriman, the first Junior League — formally named The Junior League for the Promotion of Settlement Movements — consisted of young women working to promote child health, literacy and nutrition among immigrants living on Manhattan's Lower East Side.

Today, the Junior League encompasses more than 150,000 women in 291 Leagues in four countries.

Over the past decade, many

Leagues have gone "age silent," eliminating upper age limits for membership; the Junior League of Palo Alto-Mid Peninsula did so in 1997 after previously requiring that members join by age 37 and "go sustaining" by age 40. (Sustaining members enjoy most privileges of membership but cannot vote or hold office within the League.)

Membership in the Junior League of Palo Alto-Mid Peninsula is now open to any woman age 21 and over, and members may remain "active" for as long as they continue to fulfill League requirements. ■

7 percent of American tech start-ups are founded by women.

To help close that gap, the JLP-AM is partnering with the Tech Museum of Innovation, which itself stemmed from a League task force in the late 1970s and was an official League project from 1983 to 1986. Today, the San Jose-based museum sponsors an annual Tech Challenge, a STEM competition that asks students in grades 4 to 12 to come up with a creative solution to a real-world engineering problem.

Over the coming year, League members will mentor middle school-age girls competing in the 2016 Tech Challenge. The League also will provide funding and volunteer support to establish "Girls @ The Tech Days" and a "Girls @ The Tech Committee," both of which will work to engage local students in STEM education through hands-on workshops, interactive exhibits and inspiring female speakers from the tech industry.

Our second new community project pairs us with Technovation, a global technology entrepreneurship program and competition for girls ages 10-18 that was founded in Mountain View five years ago. With the aid of a volunteer coach or teacher along with a professional mentor, participants in Technova-

tion work to research, design, build and launch mobile apps that solve existing problems in their communities.

The JLP-AM's Technovation Capacity Building Committee will support Technovation participants from San Mateo and Santa Clara counties by recruiting coaches and mentors and organizing events such as field trips to local tech companies and a regional pitch event to help prepare them for the main competition.

The League's new "Girls in STEM" focus will last five years, and is part of a shift among Junior Leagues across the country to a model known as Issue-Based Community Impact, which replaces loosely connected community projects and volunteer activities with a streamlined, issue-based approach that aims to make significant, measurable and long-lasting change in the community.

"What all of this comes down to," Ms. Hickman explains, "is making our League more relevant and visible to the surrounding community."

We hope you're familiar with some of the JLP-AM's past successes; we're certainly proud of them. But we're even more excited about the successes still to come.

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Local Junior League history: from humble beginnings

Like many of the well-established nonprofits in our region, the Junior League of Palo Alto-Mid Peninsula started off small and scrappy. In 1942, wartime rationing led to a limited supply of gas across the country, and the suburban members of the Junior League of San Francisco were finding it difficult to get to meetings and events. The organization formed auxiliaries in San Mateo, Marin and Palo Alto, with groups ranging from about 10 to 30 women gathering informally in each other's homes.

In 1965, the Palo Alto auxiliary became the Junior League of Palo Alto — the 208th League in the Association of Junior Leagues International, with 391 members. Five years later, the organization renovated the historic Latham-Hopkins Gatehouse in Menlo Park to serve as its official headquarters.

Today, the Junior League of Palo Alto-Mid Peninsula (the new name was adopted in the

early 1990s to better reflect membership demographics and the communities we serve) has approximately 900 members. We've poured tens of thousands of volunteer hours into nearly 100 community projects — some of which we nurtured from inception, including The Tech Museum of Innovation, Rebuilding Together Peninsula, the Rosalie Rendu Center, and the Daybreak Program for Homeless Youth.

In addition, our grants have supported nearly 200 local nonprofits, and our members have received valuable training that has catapulted them into leadership positions in the business world, on local and national boards, and in the public sector.

The JLPAs are also one of 17 member Leagues in the Junior Leagues of California's State Public Affairs Committee (SPAC), a nonpartisan education and advocacy organization.

SPAC delegates advocate for state legislation relevant to four focus areas — family support,

education, health, and violence prevention — and their efforts have resulted in the passage of two critical bills dealing with domestic violence (Senate Bill 563) and health care (Assembly Bill 40). In recent years, the organization has devoted particular attention to combating human trafficking.

Leading up to our current focus area, launched earlier this year — empowering girls to be leaders in science, technology, engineering and math — the JLPAs concentrated its community work on "The Health and Education of Children and Youth," and, later, "Developing the Potential of Families."

To finance our community efforts, we rely on member dues, our Endowment Fund, and The Shop, our resale boutique at 785 Santa Cruz Ave. in downtown Menlo Park. We've also put on a dizzying array of event fundraisers over the years, including fashion shows, holiday boutiques and our hugely popular

Finishing Touches Home Tour. (We're already hard at work on a unique new fundraiser that will take place next spring and is sure to shake up the traditional dinner-and-dancing model.)

None of our past accomplishments would have been possible without the tireless dedication and passion of our members, and we're always eager to wel-

come women of all ages who are interested in making new friends, developing leadership skills and, most importantly, giving back to this wonderful community we call home.

Marriott Residence Inn holds grand opening

With a satisfying “snip,” Mayor Catherine Carlton used a pair of scissors as long as her forearm to slash the red ribbon at the grand opening of the Marriott Residence Inn in Menlo Park on Sept. 16.

The 138-room hotel, located at 555 Glenwood Ave. in Menlo Park, has been open for four months. It’s on the site of a former senior housing facility called Casa de Peninsula.

The grand opening event was a way to thank the city, vendors, and everyone involved for welcoming the hotel to Menlo Park, said hotel general manager Lia Kandel. “We’re happy to be part of this neighborhood.”

Hotel patrons are typically business travelers or visitors to Stanford, front desk receptionist Jocelyn Angeles said.

Typical nightly rates are \$389 for a studio, \$409 for a one-bedroom suite, and \$419 for a two-bedroom suite. Each room has a kitchen and a king-size bed.

In addition, the hotel has a fitness room, a prepaid coupon for guests to access pool facilities at Menlo Swim and Sport, and complimentary laundry service and grocery delivery service. The hotel hosts a social hour each Monday through Wednesday with complimentary beer, wine and various snacks.

As a “residence inn,” this hotel differs primarily from other Marriott hotels by offering kitchen suites, and can accommodate guests long-term, said Ms. Angeles. In addition, she added, “It’s more homey and comfy.” ■

Bradley’s Funky Franks opens in Menlo Park

Bradley’s Funky Franks, a gourmet hot dog restaurant owned by award-winning chef Bradley Ogden, opened its doors to customers Sept. 21 at the former location of Crepes Cafe, 1195 Merrill St. in Menlo Park.

The new eatery features Mr. Ogden’s farm-to-table take on traditional American foods, exemplified by his adjacent restaurant Bradley’s Fine Diner, with a twist: locally sourced ingredients that are, if not strictly “healthy,” then at least fresh (case in point: just-the-right-amount-of-oily-and-crispy fried pickle strips).

The menu offers a choice of seven “Signature Dogs,” plus a “build your own” option with up to three toppings. These include the basics such as ketchup, relish, and a selection of mustards, but also more exotic toppings such as sriracha mayonnaise and crushed kettle chips. Other toppings available for additional cost include kale slaw, bacon wrapping, bleu cheese, and fried eggs. Prices range from \$6 to \$8.25.

Diners also choose the kind of sausage they want; options include beef, braut, spicy Italian, chicken and vegan sausages.

In addition to hot dogs, Bradley’s Funky Franks also offers

hand-spun milkshakes for \$6.

Restaurant spokesperson Franca Gargiulo said that a range of people, from high school students at Menlo-Atherton to employees at a nearby law firm, had come by for the gourmet hot dogs and shakes during the first several days of the restaurant’s operation. She said that Chef Ogden’s vision for the restaurant is for it to be a “welcoming place that is bright, cheery, and comfy.”

The restaurant offers outdoor seating with several large TVs for watching sports, and a number of children’s toys, designed to welcome young families. Ms. Gargiulo noted that the restaurant’s location across the street from the Menlo Park Caltrain station makes it an ideal embarkation point for baseball fans heading into San Francisco.

Bradley’s Funky Franks opens on the heels of the closure of Chez Franc, another gourmet hot dog restaurant on California Avenue in Palo Alto. That restaurant, in business only since January, closed in May. ■

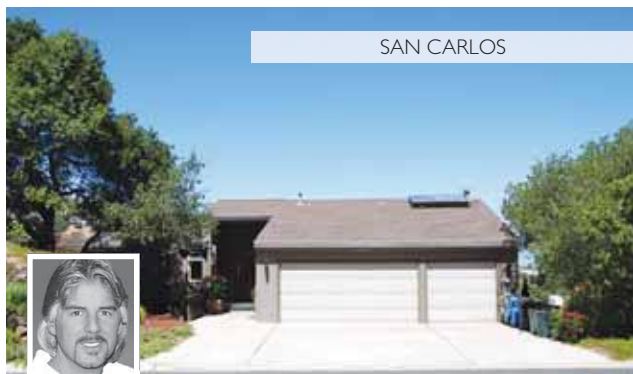

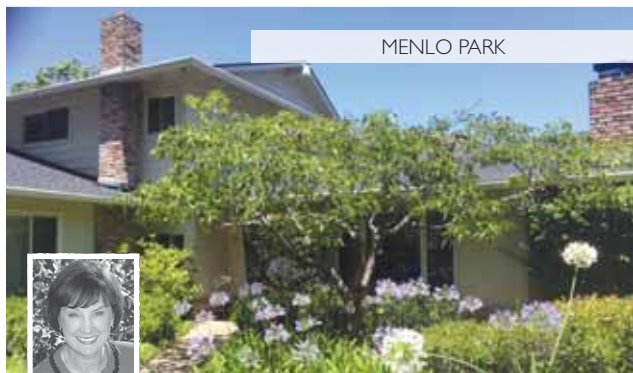

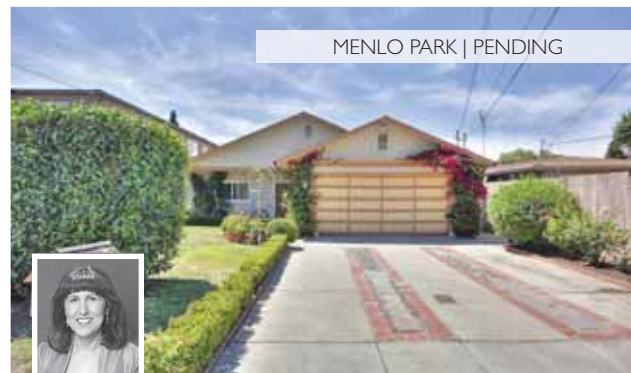
